CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS – Christmas comes to Ferring on **Saturday 15th December**. The celebrations start with tree dressing on the village green during the morning.

The Christmas Market will open at 4.30pm in the Village Hall and Club Room and will remain open until 6.30pm, with lots of local crafts and charity stalls to browse, along with tea, coffee and cakes! At 4.45pm we welcome Poi Passion who will be giving us a very special treat, with a 'light' theme! After all the awe and wonder, the Salvation Army will be playing carols from 5.15pm – do come and singalong with our choir- and the lights will be switched on at approximately 5.30pm.

If all that excitement is not enough, you can be sure that Father Christmas will be round and about to hear your Christmas wishes and Cycall will be offering toasted marshmallows!

All action takes place in front of the Village Green, and for safety reasons, the road in this area will be closed from 4.00pm - 6.00pm.

WW1 HISTORY - Residents will be aware of the new development by Asda formally known as Grenyers Field. The Parish Council wanted to inform residents that the road names (Bennett Gardens, Kilham Way & Winton Close) are named after three WW1 Soldiers who came from Ferring.

William Bennett was a former regular Royal Marine who had served in the Boer War. His family lived in Sea Lane. He had transferred to the Reserves in 1906, got married in 1910 and moved to Goring. He was working as a cleaner for the GPO when he was called up in 1914 at the age of 38. In August 1915 he was serving on HMS Ramsey an Armed Boarding Vessel when it encountered a German warship in the Moray Firth. His ship was sunk with all hands.

George Kilham was a 1914 volunteer, aged 23. He lived with his family in the cottages in Ferring Lane: they were all market garden labourers. He was killed at Hill 60 in the Second Battle of Ypres in April 1915.

John Winton was a regular soldier who enlisted in 1909. His family lived in Sea Lane. He served in India, returned for a short leave in England for Christmas 1914 and then his battalion was sent to France. Four months later he was 'missing, believed killed' in the same battle as George Kilham. Both their names are on the Menin Gate, along with 50,000 others who died in that sector and have no known grave.



VILLAGE HIGHWAYS ISSUES – Residents will recall that in a previous Parish Flyer, the Parish Council was exploring the possibility of erecting a traffic island as a pedestrian refuge in Rife Way at its junction with Ferring Street. This required working closely with WSCC Highways and applying for a Community Highways Scheme. Ferring Parish Council is pleased to advise that the application has scored well and was approved at WSCC Joint Eastern Arun Area Committee (JEAAC) 6th November. It is expected that the design will take place 2019, followed by a public consultation with the implementation expected 2020/2021.

The Community page is intended to be both a point of contact and to raise awareness of the village's community facilities, services and for some of the more prominent groups, especially for newcomers to the village. The Contact page enables residents to make comments or enquiries direct to the Parish Office.

On the sidebar of each page are headings for 'Important Information', 'Recent News' and 'The Parish flyer'.



DOG BIN – Ferring Parish Council is pleased to advise that a new dog bin has been installed at the west end of Patterson's Walk. Please may we remind dog owners to pick up after your dogs and use one of the numerous dog bins located around the village.



FERRING VILLAGE GREEN – The Parish Council are currently working in conjunction with Arun District Council (ADC) to improve the appearance of the Village Green frontage. Work to clear the foliage will commence within in the next month. Updates will be provided in future editions of the parish flyer.



BIRD FEEDING – Could we respectfully ask residents not to feed the birds on the Glebelands Recreation Ground. Scattering food on the ground could invite seagulls and rodents. If residents wish to leave food for birds, hanging feeding containers are a good alternative.



OVERGROWN HEDGES & BOUNDARIES – This is a polite request to residents to ensure that their garden plants and vegetation are kept in good order and hedges are cut back to their original boundaries and not causing any danger or obstruction to other residents.



BONFIRES - This is the time of year when many people are carrying out pruning and other garden works which generate garden waste. If you do need to have a bonfire, please do be considerate of your neighbours and the environment. Before you light a bonfire, please check that no wildlife is using it for hibernation.



KEEP FERRING TIDY - The Parish Council have been made aware of an increasing problem with litter and dog fouling within various locations of the village including on the Glebelands Recreation Ground, the Village Green and the beach. There are numerous litter and dog bins located around the village. It is an offence to drop litter or allow your dog to foul.

Please 'pick up' and dispose in the correct bins provided around the village. Thank you for helping to keep Ferring tidy.
