FERRING PARISH COUNCIL SERVING THE COMMUNITY FOR 100 YEARS - It was at Ferring's Annual Parish Meeting of 24th March 1919, that discussion turned to whether Ferring should become an independent Parish in its own right and it was decided to bid to establish a Parish Council.

The bid was successful and accordingly, a special Parish Meeting was called for the election of Ferring Parish Councillors. This took place on Tuesday 23rd September, in that same year. Following the elections, the first Ferring Parish Council meeting was held on Friday 10th October 1919.

REMEMBRANCE DAY - The annual act of Remembrance organised by Ferring Parish Council and our local Ferring Churches was held on Sunday 10th November 2019. A service at St Andrew's Church, Ferring took place followed by the laying of wreaths by 38 local organisations at the War Memorial in Ferring Street. Thank you to all who helped at or took part in this important local event.



CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS - Christmas comes to Ferring on **Saturday 7**th **December 2019**. The celebrations start with tree dressing on the village green during the morning.

The Christmas Market will open at 4.30pm in the Village Hall and Club Room and will remain open until 6.30pm, with lots of local crafts and charity stalls to browse, along with tea, coffee and cakes!

At 4.45pm we welcome back Sompting Tipteers perform Sussex Mumming Play who will be giving us a very special treat!

After all the awe and wonder, the Salvation Army will be playing carols from 5.15pm – do come and singalong with our choir- and the lights will be switched on at approximately 5.30pm.

If all that excitement is not enough, you can be sure that Father Christmas will be round and about to hear your Christmas wishes.

All action takes place in front of the Village Green, and for safety reasons, the road in this area will be closed from 4.15pm - 6.15pm.

We are looking forward to seeing everyone there on **Saturday 7th December 2019**.



HIGHWAYS ISSUES - Compass buses have asked the Parish Council to consider traffic problems on their lower Ferring No 8 bus route. This is a major problem for them and if a suitable solution is not found they may have to withdraw the service. The Highways & Community Committee of the Parish Council will consider the problem at the next meeting.



WELCOME TO OUR NEW COUNCILLORS - Ferring Parish Council are pleased to welcome our new Councillors Sally Crathern, Elizabeth Perry and John Tero, who we are sure will become valuable members of the Parish Council Team.



SPEEDING IN THE VILLAGE - In spite of measures that have been introduced to deter speeding motorists across the Village, including the introduction of the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) in 2016 for 30mph speed limit, there are still a number of 'hotspots' where vehicles travel at excess speed creating the potential for accidents to occur.

Several options have been considered to reduce the incidences of speeding and a decision taken to purchase a Vehicle Activated Speed Indication Device for use in the Village. This is an electronic sign that detects a vehicle's speed and flashes a "Slow Down" message if the speed limit is exceeded. It also records the number of vehicles that exceed the limit, which can then be used to provide data to Sussex Police to help inform them where targeted speed enforcement is required. As it is moveable and operates automatically it provides great flexibility.

Similar systems have been effective in reducing speeding in other villages across the county and it will be mounted on existing signposts, for short periods in one location and moved around the village to maximise the effectiveness. The data collected by the sign does not include any details of the vehicles, just the number of times it is triggered by time and date.



ADVICE FOR FENCES, GATES AND GARDEN WALLS - Some residents have raised queries regarding the necessity for planning consent for the erection or alteration of fences, gates and garden walls. Queries should be directed to Arun District Council who offer the following general guidance on their website: You **will** need to apply for planning permission if you wish to erect or add to a fence, wall or gate:

- if it would be over 1 metre high and next to a highway used by vehicles (or the footpath of such a highway); or over 2 metres high elsewhere; or
- your right to put up or alter fences, walls and gates is removed by an article 4 direction or a planning condition; or
- your house is a listed building or in the curtilage of a listed building or
- if the fence, wall or gate, or any other boundary involved, forms a boundary with a neighbouring listed building or its curtilage.

In a conservation area, you might need permission to take down a fence, wall or gate. Go to the links below to find out more about conservation areas and when permission may be required. Generally, you do not need planning permission for hedges as such, though if a planning condition or a covenant restricts planting (for example, on 'open plan' estates, or where a driver's sight-line could be blocked) you may need planning permission and/or other consent.

WINTER EMERGENCY ARRANGEMENTS - In the event of snow and ice, the County Council grits the main roads through the village – the route of the 700 bus service. In order to assist all other areas there are four grit bins; the east end of Langbury Lane, north entrance to the village green, north Greystoke Road and outside the convenience store south Ferring. The salt is provided for residents use for public areas only.



SEAGULL NUISANCE - We have had a few residents contact the office regarding nesting seagulls which can be very aggressive. Could we respectfully ask residents not to feed the seagulls and encourage them into their gardens.
